Based on protection concept for scout movement without camps Switzerland valid from 2.7.2021
V20210702 Ad-Hoc Working Group Protection Concept

This concept is intended to facilitate scouting activities and to ensure that the federal requirements for protection against the coronavirus are complied with. This protection concept was developed by the Swiss Scout Movement (PBS). It serves as a guideline for local Scout activities and can be supplemented by Scout sections or cantonal associations.

Starting point

-A protection concept must be adhered to for all scouting activities. In all cases, the cantonal regulations must be observed.

-A separate protection concept exists for the organisation of scout camps and training courses lasting several days.

-The protection concept is based on the current Covid-19 ordinance special situation

Basic rules

1. approach the activity without symptoms
2. special precautions for indoor activities
3. observe the hygiene rules of the BAG
4. keep attendance lists (tracing of close contacts -Contact Tracing)
5. designation of responsible persons

1. Symptoms -only healthy and symptom-free in the Camp

a. Symptoms of illness Participants and leaders with symptoms of illness are not allowed to attend the camp. Persons awaiting test results or who have had close contact with persons awaiting test results will not participate in the activity.

b. Risk groups (see BAG website) The camp is on a voluntary basis. The decision to participate and engage is based on personal responsibility. People at particular risk are advised not to participate in the camp. Parents of participants who belong to a risk group decide on their participation in the camp. This should be done in consultation with their paediatrician/family doctor and the supervising management team in order to work out individual protective measures. Leaders who belong to the risk group decide independently about their involvement in the leadership team and participation in the camp.

2. Special precautions for indoor activities

Most camp activities take place outdoors. For indoor activities (weather permitting), ventilation will be provided on a regular basis. Where possible, distances will be observed. Masks may be used where deemed appropriate by the leadership team.

3. Observance of hygiene rules

a. Wash hands thoroughly before and after the activity.

Everyone washes their hands before and after the activity. There is also an opportunity to wash hands with soap and water at any time during the activity.

b. Toilets

When using the communal toilets, there is an opportunity to wash hands before and after going to the toilet. This also applies to outdoor activities where water canisters and biodegradable soap are available for hand hygiene. Cloth towels are not used. Instead, paper towels are provided where possible. Toilets including door handles are cleaned before each activity.

c. Catering Special attention must be paid to hygiene when providing food. Hands should be washed before meals. Care should be taken not to share food from the same plate, cutlery, glasses or drinking bottles.

4. Keep attendance lists

a. Written record of participants per activity ... This list may be requested by the health authorities and must therefore be kept for 14 days.

b. Contact with other groups

Activities involving contact with other people or in public spaces: In the case of activities in public spaces, care must be taken to ensure that the distance to other groups of people is maintained. Where possible, activities in busy public places should be refrained from.

5. Responsibility

The responsibility for the implementation of the protection concept lies with the organisers of scouting activities. Accordingly, responsibility generally lies with the departments.

Exceptions are activities at other levels (e.g. cantonal associations or regions).

The heads of the departments appoint responsible persons who

- pass on the necessary information within their department,
- discuss the contents of the protection concept in the management team at the appropriate level and age,
- monitor the implementation of the protection concept, and
- make adjustments and corrections if necessary.

Important: For each activity, a person must be defined who is responsible for ensuring compliance with the applicable framework conditions of the protection concept. = Responsible person indicated in the weekly plan or leader of the group.

The implementation of the protection concept is a challenge. The responsible leaders should therefore be supported by the coaches and other people in the support network as far as possible. As a camp, we have a social responsibility. All camp participants/leaders should adhere to the protection concept in solidarity and with a high degree of self-responsibility.

When visiting the indoor swimming pool, the protection concept of OVAVERVA applies. It is superior and will be observed.
